# Ministers' Message: Growing Deeper in 2023

# **Evolving Culture: Becoming Earth-Care Stewards**

Grace has been learning about and sharing how to be a good Earth Steward this fall. Here is how buying local helps Calgary and our community as well as the Earth.

### Why Buy Local

The multiplier effect is the amount of local economic activity that is triggered by the purchase of one item. The more a dollar circulates in an area, and the faster it circulates, the more income, wealth and jobs it creates.

At the grocery store, when you purchase a tomato grown locally, the money spent at the grocery store will pay the distributor, who will pay the grower. The grower will pay staff, who will go to restaurants, movies and so on. When you purchase a tomato grown from California, for instance, the grocer will pay the distributor, who will pay the importer, who will pay the wholesaler. The money from the California tomato doesn't stay in the community.

When you're choosing between those two tomatoes, it's important to remember:

- many of the food items at the grocery store travel over 1500 miles to reach your plate
- regions with more local businesses have 26% fewer vehicle miles travelled by consumers
- local businesses typically set up in existing buildings which means less urban sprawl, habitat loss and pollution
- small businesses donate 2.5 times more per employee to local non-profit and charitable causes
- online shopping produced over 465 million pounds of plastic packaging waste in 2019
- for every \$100 spent at a locally owned business, \$68 recirculates and remains

- in the local economy
- small local businesses are the largest employer with 90% new jobs created by locally owned businesses
- local businesses create a stronger tax base, which creates better public services

Local businesses create uniqueness within a community. They select products based on local interests and typically have better service.

Our spending habits have greater impacts beyond what we place in our shopping bags or online shopping carts. Shopping locally can help the environment by decreasing pollution from transportation, reducing waste and reducing packaging.

## Session Highlights: December (Session meetings take place monthly.)

At its regular meeting on December 12, the Session:

- opened with reflection on Isaiah 35:1-20, God's promise of joy and the encouragement it brings
- expressed its gratitude for all the work behind the scenes to have such wonderful events as Messy Church, Open Mic, and the All is Calm, All is Bright music concert, the joy of lonely people being welcomed and included, and the delight of Giyth's wisdom in the Time, Talent and Treasure Video
- received encouragement from the moderator to continue to be intentional about cultural changes at Grace, around discussion of money, expectations of leadership, and seeking to become what Grace is called to be
- approved the workplan for the Spiritual Growth Committee for January through June 2023. The July through December 2023 workplan will be finalized after consultation with Maren upon her return in April
- supported the addition of Bruce Perrault and Ben Matthews to the Engagement & Service Committee
- accepted minor edits to various definitions and policies included in the Session Manual
- approved updates to the Roll; the number of Professing Members is now 389 and the number of Adult Adherents is 156
- agreed to receive new members during worship on January 8, 2023
- approved the wedding of Christiaan Laurejis and Sharon Dias to be held in the sanctuary on December 31, 2022
- received updates from the Committees showing good progress in initiatives consistent with their workplans and our mission and values
- referred to the Facilities Committee a request to create a plan for the refurbishment of the front steps that would allow year-round use
- closed with thanks and prayer.

### **Grace's Living Wage: Basic Needs at Minimum Wage**

Grace has been paying a living wage to employees for several years. Learn why a living wage is important and what it means in Alberta and Calgary.

### A Living Wage Versus Minimum Wage

Alberta's minimum wage of \$15 per hour was established Oct 2018. At that time a living wage would have been \$20.76 per hour. Today, the living wage in Calgary is \$22.40 per hour.

When the minimum wage level was set in 2018, a single parent with two children would have needed to work 55.35 hours per week to meet basic needs. The working definition of Basic Needs doesn't include all of the costs associated with managing a household. For instance, transportation isn't considered a basic need.

Long working hours at minimum wage leaves households with very little time left for any activities beyond just living. Earning minimum wage can lead to a cycle of poverty that can last generations since parents are less able to support learning and development of their children.

Today, with high inflation, the \$15 per hour minimum wage can only buy 88% of the goods and services it would have been able to purchase in 2018.

A living wage is the hourly wage needed to cover basic expenses and afford individuals the means to participate in the community. It considers the hourly rate needed for a household to maintain a modest standard of living after government transfers and taxes have been subtracted. Grace church pays employees at living wage.

The Engagement and Services Committee (E&S) supports various programs to help individuals. In addition to hosting a satellite Food Bank location, Grace supplements the hampers with items such as toilet paper and dish soap. English Learning Language (ELL) and Never Too Late programs offer skills training to help increase opportunities for individuals hoping to eventually earn more than minimum wage. Additionally, the E&S Committee is planning to host a new tutoring & snacks program to help younger learners.
