Reconciliation Runner

Background:

In the Fall-Winter term of 2022-23, one of the Grace Quilters completed two graduate education courses: Indigenous Knowledge & Leadership, and Creative Processes. This quilted "Reconciliation Runner" is the creative end that blends elements of learning from both courses.

The Reconciliation Runner was designed to be a teaching tool: The patterns and colors are representative of general themes within Indigenous cultures; it is meant to be a visual reminder of the need for reconciliation between Indigenous peoples, and non-Indigenous peoples; and to stir reflection on the work of truth and reconciliation.

The information below about the Reconciliation Runner does not presume complete and exhaustive knowledge of Indigenous cultures or Indigenous ways of knowing. It is meant to spark curiosity and interest, about whatever it is each of us needs to learn to become people of reconciliation.

Material and Design:

All design choices- pattern, colours, and individual fabrics- reference some common Indigenous cultural priorities, such as the importance of land, and cultural and spiritual values.

Pattern:

- The runner features a traditional "Bear's Paw" pattern; in these quilts the paws may be repeated or oriented in any variety of ways. The runner has five blocks made up of four paws, in different colours, each oriented outward.
- In the Indigenous lands we live on, the Bear is considered to be a sacred animal, and often symbolizes courage or bravery. The Bear's Paw design is an effective reminder that acts of reconciliation take courage.
- The black paw fabric's patters is pairs of clasped hands, which references the
 importance of community, collaboration and working together. The hands form the
 shape of a heart, reminding us that loving respect for one another is at the core of
 reconciling relationships.

Colour and Fabric:

All of the fabric designs are free-flowing, and loosely structured, with the exception
of the black fabric and the floral border to represent how many Indigenous cultures
embrace and value organic thought processes, connectedness, openness to the
multi-dimensionality of life, and being a part of the large whole of creation.

- The Bear Paws are set on a green background, referencing the underlying importance of the land to all Indigenous cultures.
- The brown square in the middle of each Bear's Paw block symbolizes the patch of mud on the Turtle's back, from which all of Turtle Island (North America) grew, according to the Ojibway creation story.
- The four paw colours reference the colours of the Spirit Wheel or Medicine Wheel: Yellow, Red, Black and White. These colours are very common across all Indigenous cultures in Canada, although the meanings they hold can change across cultures.
- The orange border and binding emphasize the importance of working towards reconciliation together, and that intention and goal can help unite us all.
- The floral border shows an abundance of flowers in various sizes and stages of growth because reconciliation requires growth and new ways of being.







Truth and Reconciliation: Calls to Action

The Presbyterian Church in Canada has endorsed the Calls to Action published by the Truth and Reconciliation Commission. The Truth, Healing & Reconcili-Action Team at Grace shares the following Call to Action, information, and prayer as a way to engage in the work of Truth, Healing and Reconciliation.

Truth and Reconciliation Commission – Call to Action no. 48 says:

We call upon faith groups "to formally adopt and comply with the principles, norms, and standards of the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples as a framework for reconciliation."

Why are Indigenous rights important?

We are called to ensure our actions and behaviours uphold the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (UNDRIP). The principles address: protection from discrimination and violence, the right to health, safety and well-being, and a recognition of the inherent worth of Indigenous identity, spirituality, knowledge, laws and governance. These principles are a minimum standard for the well-being of Indigenous peoples. In Canada, the legacy of anti-Indigenous racism has meant that Indigenous peoples are more likely to experience violence, higher mortality rates and poorer health outcomes across a wide spectrum of health-related issues (including emotional, physical, spiritual, and mental health), and barriers to housing, education, employment, treatment, food, and economic security. While the church has apologized and confessed its role in running Residential Schools and rejected the Doctrine of Discovery, we also acknowledge that systemic racism shapes our society, which includes the church. It will only be eliminated with ongoing intentional action. UNDRIP is a critical framework to guide our actions as we seek to eliminate anti-Indigenous racism.

Prayer:

Creator God,

You have called us to justice and to right relationship with you, with each other and with creation, but we confess our policies and practices do not reflect your will and the politics Christ taught. As a church, we participated in policies and were shaped by doctrines and dogmas that distorted and misrepresented the Good News of the Gospel and that were unjust and harmful.

We repent of these ways, and we seek anew to live in ways that reflect your love and grace.

Guide us so that we might uphold justice and reconciliation in the practices that shape our lives, and the policies that govern us.

Strengthen the conviction that human and Indigenous rights point toward the inherent dignity of all people.

Let us work for reconciliation. Amen.
